After you hear both profiles, please tell me which candidate you would be more likely to support.

Candidate Campos says we need to be realistic about the so-called Green Economy. He believes that to improve the California economy we need control energy costs for working families and businesses. Campos will work with our utilities to encourage use of cheaper and cleaner burning fossil fuels as we wait for solar and other forms of clean energy to become more affordable.

Candidate Reyes says the time for the Green Economy is NOW and the utilities are just stalling at the expense of working families. He points out that more clean energy, including rooftop solar, will both improve the health of our families and provide us with a stable long-term energy supply. He also points to studies proving that these energy sources are affordable today and that by growing the Green economy, we create jobs and encourages economic growth far more than by staying with the old ways of generating energy.

In order to encourage more rooftop solar, California, along with 42 other states, adopted a law called “Net Metering” that allows homes, schools, and businesses to get full retail rate credit for the extra energy their solar panels produce. In other words, under net metering, utilities buy excess power from consumers with solar panels at the same rate that utilities charge consumers to buy electricity. The solar energy goes into the grid for utilities to sell.
